Meet Waltham Abbey's youngest Mayor, Councillor Jodie Lucas



Jodie, congratulations on becoming Waltham Abbey's youngest Mayor. How does it feel?

I am so delighted to have been elected as Mayor of Waltham Abbey, its such privilege to hold this position in the town my family has resided in for nearly 200 years! I was only 21 years old when I was first co-opted onto the town council and have been the youngest member since.

You have been a Town Councillor for over 5 years, what made you get into local politics?

I have such a passion for Waltham Abbey and care about the area and our residents. I have varied personal, academic and professional skills and a strong voice and I wanted to share my own views, including those that represent the younger residents of the town.

As the town starts to emerge out of lockdown, what are your main priorities for our local community?

As a town we have shown what fantastic community spirit we have. I would love to remember my year as Mayor with bringing people back together, enjoying and embracing the town we are privileged to call home. I hope that we can all fully support all of our local shops and facilities, especially including those that have been so restricted during the pandemic.

What would be your advice for any young person with an interest in local politics?

If you have a genuine passion for the local area and have a view and opinion, the best place to be is to be involved. My interests first started in school council meetings and progressed with joining the young Conservatives.

I first stood as a District Council candidate at only 18 years old which was a fantastic insight into local processes. I have learnt that there is so much to learn and the sooner you can be involved the better!

You also work full-time as a Health and Safety Consultant - what are the challenges of keeping up with a demanding job and being a Town Councillor?

I have worked as a Health and Safety Consultant for 8 years and currently work for a company based in Harlow. There is of course additional workload of being a councilor and I am often asked how do I have time but I honestly believe if you have an interest and a passion then you can find the time. Most of our meetings are late afternoon and evenings and I am a member of the committees that suit my availability.

You have announced you will be supporting the charity Young Minds - can you tell us why this charity is important to you?

I chose this charity primarily as mental health is at its most prevalent at the moment due to the increased stress and strain the pandemic has had on us all and especially the younger generation.

When you have any free time, how do you like to spend it?

I love spending time with my family. I live on a small holding and I am very lucky to have grown up with horses, chickens and lots of other animals. I also love travelling, nature and adventure and have been lucky enough to visit some incredible countries.

I look forward being able to travel again as soon as it is safe to do so! For now, let's continue to follow government guidance, keep washing our hands and keeping a safe distance whilst we need to and hopefully we will continue moving in the right direction.

A Waltham Abbey Neighbourhood Plan is being prepared by a steering group of local residents, working on behalf of the Town Council to compliment the EFDC Local Plan. The district local plan determines how the district will evolve over the lifetime of the plan, circa 20 years. The EFDC Local plan is currently with Government inspectors for scrutiny and review. Our Neighbourhood Plan, if approved, will support the Local Plan with decisions we have made for Waltham Abbey. The plan will be about how, guided by you, we envisage our town will evolve, working within the Local Plan.

Neighbourhood Plans are an opportunity to influence planning decisions to ensure they reflect the type of development local residents have identified. Over time we have held many meetings and met with residents at events such as the Town Show to collect opinions arising from the developing plan. There are a number of issues Residents have raised concerns about and asked us to address. However, many of these matters fall outside the remit for any Neighbourhood Plan.

We list some of these issues below. Where we receive a large response, we will attempt to canvas councillors at the appropriate level of Town, District or County, to see if they can be implemented outside the Neighbourhood Plan.

Broomstickhall Road is a bus route that runs from the mini roundabout at the junction of Honey Lane/Farmhill Road, towards King Harold School and Ninefields. Parked vehicles cause difficulties to vehicles travelling in opposite directions where there is no gap to allow traffic to pass. It was frequently reported that this often causes road rage and extreme frustration for bus drivers who regularly have to negotiate this road.

The proposal to remedy this situation is to make Broomstickhall Road one way. with vehicles travelling from Honey Lane towards Ninefields.
